

I am praising you this day, O God, because I have no place else to go. You are the last resort of a shattered creation that resists every gracious invitation and refuses to make you first. And what is true on a cosmic scale is all too true for

this shattered creature as well.

So here we are...at the beginning of another year with nothing to show for all our efforts, and hoping for the best. And, my God, that is what you are. The only possibility for hope.

Selah.

I am praising you this day, O God, awestruck and wonder-filled at grace



beyond my ability to grasp, let alone to know. You are the Lord. We do not deserve your attention or your healing or your love. Most days, we don't even want your mercy. But we are desperate, desperate for it all. And in this season that would teach us the holy values of waiting and expectation, we cry out in our need: "Amen. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus." †

We will be learning new ways of gathering this year as we anticipate and celebrate the coming of Christ among us. It's Emmanuel by way of Zoom and Facebook...with more limited opportunities for in-person gatherings than we're used to. But that won't keep us from the praise and thanksgiving that are part of Advent and Christmas.

Join us early on Christmas Eve. We're planning a special service for children and families at 7 p.m. on December 24. Readings. Favorite carols. A story to share. A special gift for the children. And a bedtime prayer for Christmas Eve. You can join us via livestream (see the Sunday options above). But we encourage you to register at holytrinityakron.org so that we can send along that special gift to the children in your household.

Join us later on Christmas Eve. We will gather in-person and via livestream at 10 p.m. for Christmas Eve Candlelight and Holy Communion. We will enjoy musical offerings from the Trinity Bell Choir, a mixed vocal quartet, harp and cello. We will revel in the story of God's coming among us in the Christ Child. We will gather to be fed at Christ's precious table. Together we will proclaim and be sent out with the good news of God's saving incarnation.

Join us on Christmas Morning. Our celebration continues at 9:30 a.m. on Christmas Day as we gather in person and via livestream to reflect once more on the light of Christ born into humankind. Favorite carols, the Holy Gospel, and the Lord's Supper will feed and nourish us.

## The Joy of Watts

When we sing the hymn Joy to the World, we think of Christmas. It is a great Christmas carol, but there is more meaning to it than that. Sometimes we limit our appreciation of a piece of music because we associate it with certain experiences or cultural celebrations. It helps us to know that Isaac Watts (1674-1748) wrote this hymn to paraphrase Psalm 98:4-9. Hymnsinging for Christmas - or any other season was rare in Watts' early life. The only songs people sang in worship were psalms. Despite this restriction, psalms were not often sung well. Thomas Mace, a contemporary of Watts, wrote of the "whining, tooting, yelling, or screeching" heard in many churches. One day in 1692, Isaac gave up singing in worship, disgusted by what he heard. His father suggested he try to write something better, and Watts' first hymn was sung the next Sunday. He began a new era in English hymn singing, eventually writing over 600 hymns, many of which are considered among the finest in the English language. Watts is known as the "Father of English Hymnody."

Consider the first line of *Joy to the World* ... "the Lord is come." This is a call for each of us to make room in our hearts for God not just at Advent or Christmas, but daily. We can sing this song in our hearts and minds in any season.

The next time you hear this joyful song, take a moment to remind yourself "the Lord is come," thank the Lord for his presence, and pray that those around you may know the joy of Emmanuel – God with us.

And don't be surprised if the next time you sing this hymn at Holy Trinity is... midsummer. †



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As has been mentioned before, Invite-Welcome-Connect is an initiative created by a member of the Episcopal Church named Mary Parmer. Over the past five years, the Renaissance Committee has looked a quite a few examples of church growth. What makes IWC particularly attractive is that it was created and successfully implemented by a mainline denomination, not a contemporary "evangelical" church. (Yes, we know that our original name was The Evangelical Church of the Holy Trinity and we belong to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America). What follows is testimony from one Episcopal diocese.


"In the Diocese of Alabama, nearly a third of our ninety-two churches have participated in Invite Welcome Connect workshops. These churches range in size from 75 to 550 average Sunday attendance and are in locations from downtown and historic to suburban, from lake and resort to small town. After a year, these churches were polled about their successes and challenges while incorporating the Invite Welcome

Connect ministry.

"We found that when people are dedicated to implementing this ministry, they experience vibrancy and change in their congregation. In addition, we learned that there are as many ways to succeed in this ministry as there are people implementing it. What works for one church may fail at another. It is essential for you to know your church's personality to integrate this ministry into your church's way of being.

"One of the most important things to remember is Keep at it. Don't let one or two obstacles derail your ministry. Tweak your strategy when necessary....

"Start with things that are easy and don't' require large investment. Look for early success then move to items that require funding. Start with creating a team for each ministry area of Invite Welcome Connect, then empower and equip people to start (or stop) initiatives and programs. The key to success is buy-in from the clergy and involvement and commitment of lay leaders." † (Emphasis added)







For the first time since March, DLM Food & Resources opened its doors on October 29-31 for limited in-person shopping for clothing. Twenty families attended over the 3-day period. There was a tremendous amount of prep work that took place to prepared for people to come in for shopping. For example, all clothing was sorted and individually bagged. Only one family member was permitted inside with a limit of three families shopping at a time. Masks were required, and all were physically distant from one another. Volunteers were onhand to assist if needed. †



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## Your Guide for Sunday Morning In-Person Worship



In-person worship has resumed on Sunday morning with one liturgy at 9:30 a.m. Livestream worship continues for those who are in at-risk populations or who wish to continue to avoid large gatherings. Those attending in person may be seen on the broadcast.



You must observe 6' physical distancing upon entry into and exit from the building and while in the Sanctuary.



Entry to the building will be by the north narthex door only. An usher in the parking lot will direct you to this entrance. Dismissal after worship will be guided row-by-row by the ushers through the door into the office lobby. You are asked to immediately exit through the

office entrance to your vehicle. Both the entry and exit doors will be kept open (weather permitting) to reduce surface contact and increase ventilation.



Upon entry, you will be asked to do the following:

- Sign-in—this will assist public health organizations if contact tracing is needed.
- Have your temperature taken—anyone with cold, allergy, or flu-like symptoms or anyone

with a temperature of  $100^\circ$  or more should stay home and seek appropriate medical care. Anyone with a temperature of  $100^\circ$  or more will not be admitted.

• Sanitize your hands—a hand sanitizing station will be set-up.



Masks must be worn by those not leading the liturgy. Please bring your own mask; only a limited supply will be available at the building. If you cannot or will not wear a mask, please worship at home via the livestream.



Seating in the Sanctuary will be guided by ushers on a first-come, first-served basis beginning from the front of the nave. Family groups from the same household may be seated together.



Hand sanitizer will be located near all doors and throughout the sanctuary. You must sanitize your hands upon entry and after any physical contact.



Additional changes to take note of:

- There will be no congregational singing during the liturgy. There will be other music (vocal and instrumental) offered by the worship loaders.
- There will be no sharing of the peace with physical contact. There will be no celebration of Holy Communion at this time.
- Bibles, hymnals and other printed materials have been removed from the news
- There will be no printed order of service provided. An electronic
  version is available for download on your own mobile device or
  download it from the website and print it at home to bring with you.
- We will not pass offering plates. Offering plates will be placed near the sanctuary doors (both entrance and exit) to receive our tithes and eifts.
- Restrooms will be available for use; one person at a time will be permitted.
- The nursery will not be open and child care is not available.
- There will be no in-person fellowship or discipleship time.

All public areas and high touch objects/surfaces will be thoroughly cleaned and sanitized before and after all in-person activities.

Beyond Sunday worship: small groups, ministry teams, committees, and studies are encouraged to continue meeting online.

Groups may meet in the building, if necessary, but must abide by physical distancing and sanitization protocols.

Meetings will be scheduled so that only one group is in the building at a time, and so that the meeting space may be cleaned/sanitized before and after.

This guide will be reviewed, modified and updated on an on-going basis, and as such, is subject to change, even to the point of closing again, should a change in the public health situation demand it. Visit our website for the most current information relating to this guide.
