In 2011, guest artist Nicholas Pavkovic won the San Francisco Conservatory's Highsmith Award for orchestral composition. He also serves as the director of the Ross McKee Foundation. He joins Prism Percussion, the dynamic San Franciscobased percussion duo that regularly performs works by underrepresented composers and demonstrates repertoire for a wide pallet of sounds available to percussionists. The duo's presence on stage

is "both musically and visually stunning," affirms Jessica Balik of San Francisco Classical Voice. Their passion for percussion chamber music and for collaborating with composers and other musicians led them to create this duo, which fosters the creation of new works. They are also joined by soprano Emily Hall.

## The Longest Advent

On Sunday, November 28, the Church turns the calendar page and begins a new liturgical year. And in keeping with our tradition, that new year begins with the season of Advent...four weeks of waiting, preparing, and anticipation that find their conclusion at the celebration of Christmas and the birth of Jesus as God's incarnate Word.

I remember as a kid that this waiting time seemed terribly long. Christmas, with its gifts and family celebrations and other traditions was such a big deal. The days between Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve would drag by. We read our devotions and lit our candles every night, but the time never seemed to move fast enough for us. Those of us of a certain age found that the Chipmunks expressed it perfectly: "We can hardly stand the wait. Please, Christmas, don't be late." But, honestly, I'm not sure how well I can do with waiting this year. And maybe you find yourself in a similar place. After all, it feels like we've been waiting for almost two years...stuck in Advent since March 2020. Shut down. Locked out. Isolated from one another. The songs we want to sing stuck in our throats. The faces we long to behold half-hidden behind masks. And still the pandemic lingers.

It's made us all a bit cranky...and some of us crankier than others. Please know: The decisions that our Congregation Councils have made over the past 20 months have not been easy. Together, we've done our best to lean on the science in an effort to keep folks safe and still together. The guidelines we've adopted are built on data and recommendations from leading medical schools (Harvard, Georgetown, Stanford), the CDC and NIH, and the Ecumenical Consultation on Worship, Fellowship, and the Sacraments. These guidelines are not arbitrary, nor were they concocted on a whim. The leadership of this congregation has been careful and deliberate. And I am thankful for their willingness to serve so faithfully in difficult times.

But still we wait. And we want the waiting to be over. Enough of this wretched Advent already. I get it.

I'm wondering. Can we learn to wait in healthier ways? Can we use this November and the upcoming Advent season itself as an opportunity to replace our anger and our frustration with a deeper understanding of the value of not immediately getting what we want? Covid will pass by at some point. We will gather and sing and rejoice together again. But how marvelous would it be if we were able to spend the time until then constructing better ways for us to faithfully cope with our disappointments and our anticipation?

Dear friends in Christ: hang in there. Know that God abides with us...just as God tended Israel for 40 years in the wilderness and Judah for 70 years in Babylon. We are being tested now, but the day of our deliverance is surely coming. Let's work to arrive together at that glorious morning with joy and thanksgiving. †

- A new schedule would take effect
  January 1, 2022 and will increase from


## Volunteer with the DLM 'Box Experience'

Just as Jesus Christ served others, we too are called to serve our neighbors. Volunteering just a few hours with DLM provides struggling families with what they need ... food, love, respect and hope.

DLM was formed in memory of Debra Manteghi, long-time member of Holy Trinity and founder of Project Rise. Debra served the families involved with Project Rise with passion, dignity and love. DLM is in memory of Debra's initials, but it also stands for something more ... Dare to Love More.

Is there any reason why you can't 'dare to love more' and serve with DLM? There are a number of ways you can volunteer your time with DLM, whether it's a few hours or several days. There are opportunities where you can be seated, standing or both. There is computer/data entry work, physical work and everything in-between. See below.

## What is the 'DLM Box Experience'?

In 2020 at the onset of the pandemic, DLM swiftly changed to a food box delivery system, the only food pantry to do so in Summit County. Families in need register to have a food box delivered to their home. Food boxes are prepared and delivered twice each month; they are filled with non-perishable items, fresh produce, dairy, and meat (amount of food is based on family size). In addition, personal care and infant care boxes are also prepared and delivered as needed. Clothing is made available upon request. †

#### The Week Prior to Delivery

#### **Tuesday:**

- Assemble empty boxes for non-perishables
- Enter family information in the Freshtak system Wednesday:
- Unload the Food Bank food delivery truck
- Sort items and stock shelves
- Update the inventory system
- Fill the assembled boxes with non-perishables Thursday:

#### Continue filling boxes with non-perishables

 Finalize contents, put documentation inside boxes and seal them

#### Week of Delivery

#### Tuesday:

- Assemble empty boxes for fresh produce Wednesday:
- Bag meat, dairy and other refrigerated/frozen food
- Put family names on hygiene bags

#### Thursday:

- Fill hygiene bags and household bags
- Load carts with non-perishable boxes
- Load carts with hygiene bags

#### Friday:

- Fill empty boxes with fresh produce, meat, dairy and other refrigerated food
- Help load drivers' cars with delivery boxes
- Help clean up after all boxes are loaded

#### Every Week, Tuesday - Friday

- Sort and organize clothing and shoe donations
- Re-stock clothing, shoes and accessories as needed

## DLM by the Numbers

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, DLM Food & Resources has continued to operate and provide food boxes, personal care items along with cleaning supplies, and laundry items to those families involved with Project RISE and others who are in need. Clothing is given to those who inquire.

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## Partnerships Make It Happen for DLM

Part Two of a Two-Part Series

Over the past four years, the DLM Food & Resources Ministry has grown and expanded beyond anything imagined. Throughout, DLM has formed numerous partnerships with a variety of area agencies and organizations. These partnerships have helped to expand the DLM program and its services as well as to increase its access to additional community resources in order to better help individuals and families. Here are some of DLM's partners. †

The Highlands **Teen Pregnancy** Shelter is currently the only licensed teen pregnancy



shelter in the State of Ohio, providing residential services to homeless or at-risk pregnant mothers ages 12-21, and their babies. DLM supplies diapers, wipes baby personal care items, and clothing if needed.

#### IBH's REACH Program



based volunteer activities and support meetings that foster safe friendships, reinforce values learned during treatment and create a strong sense of community. DLM Gives IBH Reach Participants a safe place to volunteer and also provides food, hygiene, clothing and diapers as needed.



The Summit County Continuum of Care is a regional planning body that delivers housing and supportive services and provides funding local agencies to rehouse those who are homeless. DLM provides food and personal care items for homeless individuals and families who cannot enter into a shelter and have to be placed in a hotel due to Covid-19 as well as to homeless individuals and families who cannot enter into a shelter because of having high risk health related conditions.

#### **Street Outreach Services (S.O.S)**

**Program** assists at-risk and homeless youth, ages 16-24, through the operation of a drop-in center and a variety of outreach activities. The purpose of this program is to help youth escape homelessness and secure safe, stable housing. DLM supplies food for hot meals at the center and makes available non-perishable food, personal care items, clothing, and laundry supplies for youth to take with them as needed.

#### The **Homeless** Charities seeks to

meet the



homeless where they are today to get them to where they want to go tomorrow by offering transitional support services that bridge the gap

between street living and home living. DLM supplies food for hot meals and makes available backpacks filled with non-perishable food and personal care items.

#### Hope **Behavioral** Health Counseling Services



provides self-esteem, marriage counseling, mood disorders, relationship struggles, sexual addiction, stress, substance abuse, and addiction issues, trauma, and much more. DLM has been able to provide mental health information to individuals and families in need of emotional, behavioral, and mental health support.

DLM relies heavily



on the generosity of volunteers. Two groups who have faithfully served are Faith Lutheran Church and Western Reserve Academy, Hudson. Each month, Faith Lutheran members help sort, pack and deliver the food boxes. They also donate items throughout the year. Students from Western Reserve Academy volunteer to help prepare the food boxes and personal care kits in addition to sorting and organizing clothing, shoes and accessories. †

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#### November 30 - Save This Date!

Food. It's one of our basic needs. But not everyone in our community can get food. Due to a myriad of issues, situations and circumstances, many individuals and families, including children, find themselves without enough food each month. That's where DLM Food & Resources comes in.


DLM was a choice food pantry prior to COVID. This meant that people were able to come and choose the food they wanted for their families. Then the pandemic



hit and everything shut down. Not so for DLM. In April 2020, DLM quickly changed its processes and started preparing and delivering food boxes to people. This enabled more families to get the help they urgently needed. DLM was and still is the only food pantry in Summit County to make this type of change.

The 'DLM Box Experience' (what its become known as) is more than a box of free food for someone. It's an experience that is filled with love and care as each box is filled and somewhat customized to meet a family's needs. It's an opportunity to serve our neighbors and show them the dignity and respect they so rightfully deserve. It's a moment of hope, joy and thankfulness from families when a food box is delivered to their doorsteps. Yes, DLM is so much more.

DLM stands for 'Dare to Love More.' On Giving Tuesday, November 30, we encourage you, even dare you, to love more and give to DLM. Our goal is to raise \$25,000. It's a large number but achievable with your help. Every financial contribution, big and small, will truly make a difference in the lives of thousands of individuals right here in Summit County. 
