Michael Kelly, baritone & David Leisner, guitar


Praised as “expressive and dynamic” and “vocally splendid,” American baritone Michael Kelly continues to distinguish himself as a consummate artist, sought-after for his riveting interpretations of recital, concert and operatic repertoire.

David Leisner is an electrifying performing artist, a distinguished composer, and a master teacher. *American Record Guide* cited him as “among the finest guitarists of all time.” He records mostly for the Azica label, his compositions are published primarily by Theodore Presser Co., and he is the Chair of the Guitar Department at the Manhattan School of Music.

Die Schöne Müllerin, Franz Schubert's 20-song cycle about unrequited love, originally for voice and piano, is performed by the duo in Leisner's apt arrangement for voice and guitar. It is one of the most beloved pieces of music ever written.

It sometimes feels like there's not much good one can count on in these days. Economic turmoil? Social unrest? Political ineptitude and duplicity? Persistent pandemic? Oh, yes...we've got all those things in spades. And we've had them in earnest for going on six months. And they don't appear to be going away anytime soon. If this is the "new normal" that everyone talks about, then it's not a very appealing environment in which to live and work and play. There really is only so much hurt and anxiety, death and destruction, that we can bear before we simply break down.

It's a good thing that the days' headlines aren't the only story to be told.

I've been at work lately on our annual giving campaign. It's coming later this fall as we consider our financial support for the congregation in 2021. In pondering how we might invite our members (and non-members, for that matter) to continue and even increase their support for Holy Trinity's mission, the concerns of the world around us are weighing heavily on my mind. Some of us have suffered and are suffering deeply during these days. It's not easy to think about support for the work of the church when your job has disappeared or your loved one is sick, even dying. Others among us may not have been touched to the same extent by illness or job loss, but we still must deal with the psychological and spiritual effects of the profound upset around us. That has an impact, too. And how do we realistically plan for the year ahead when we've watched our best laid plans for 2020 get shredded? Maybe getting by day-by-day, week-by-week is the best we can hope for. *insert deep sigh here*

As is often the case for me, I found comfort and a renewed sense of purpose in the Scriptures and hymns.

In Matthew 28:16-20, Jesus meets his worshipping but doubting band of left-over disciples on a Galilean hillside. He gives them a mission: "Go. Teach. Baptize." He doesn't sketch out a timeline, or fully develop the tactics for this effort. That's something the disciples will need to figure out for themselves given the places and

peoples to whom they are sent. And, indeed, the early Church did employ a number of different tactics in their going and teaching and baptizing. And the Spirit of God blessed that effort to such an extent that you are reading a church newsletter 2000 years later.

But in addition to that mission, he makes them a promise: "Remember. I am with you always, even to the end of the age." In other words, the Crucified and Risen One goes with the Church in its efforts. They are not just turned loose with no support. Christ himself goes with, works through, and undergirds every effort the Church makes.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. Romans 15:7

In last month’s Highlights, the Renaissance Committee introduced the concept of Invite-Welcome-Connect as a pathway to reversing the slow decline in membership in Holy Trinity. During the month of August, in the Midweek Word, we’ve discussed various ways to participate in the Invite portion of this process.

But, how do we welcome people when they respond to our invitations and just come to a service to ‘check us out?’ As the book Invite Welcome Connect says, “Welcome is the ministry of hospitality, and this essential covers everything from first impressions to follow-up with visitors. Welcome asks the question ‘Do your clergy, staff, and lay leaders teach, preach, and model a theology of welcome and hospitality?’ . . . Welcome extends beyond being nice.” (IWC 51-2)

We need to be intentional in welcoming anyone and everyone who comes into contact with Holy Trinity, whether they are folks who are helping us in the fulfillment of our mission or those who benefit from our mission activities. Everyone wants to feel welcome, but most of us are a bit shy when first placed in unfamiliar circumstances. It is then when we need to take extra care to make them feel comfortable and to let them know we welcome their presence.

So, during the month of September, in the Midweek Word, we’ll be sharing some ideas about how to welcome people as well as some examples of what happens when we fail to.

Holy Trinity will soon engage in service work right here in our community. We are one of over 9,100 congregations participating in “God’s work. Our hands.” Sunday, on September 13. Across the country, thousands of members will engage in service work to make a positive change in our communities, build and deepen relationships and share God’s love.

Because of COVID-19, we will not have in person service projects this year. We can still engage in service while physically distancing. We are collecting items for DLM Food and Resources. These items include personal care products (shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste, tooth brushes, shaving cream, razors, body wash, feminine products, etc.), Baby items (diapers, baby wipes, baby shampoo, baby lotion, bottles, diaper rash cream, etc.), and Laundry items (detergent, fabric softener, dryer sheets, stain remover, hangers, etc.).



**Organist
Christa Rakich**



Concert and recording artist Christa Rakich has performed widely throughout North America, Europe, and Japan. From now through June of 2021 she is Visiting Professor of Organ at Oberlin Conservatory in Ohio.

As a Fulbright Scholar, Rakich studied with renowned Bach interpreter Anton Heiller at the Hochschule für Musik in Vienna, Austria. She holds Bachelor's degrees in Organ and German from Oberlin College (Phi Beta Kappa). After receipt of her Master's degree with honors from New England Conservatory, she joined the faculty there, where she taught for many years, serving ultimately as department co-chair. She also served on the faculties at Westminster Choir College, Brandeis University, and the University of Connecticut, and as Assistant University Organist at Harvard.

A prizewinner at international organ competitions, Rakich has received particular acclaim for her interpretations of the music of J.S. Bach. She recorded his *Clavierübung III*, Leipzig Chorales, and Trio Sonatas. Other organ recordings include *Deferred Voices: Organ Music by Women Composers*, *Transcriptions from St. Justin's*, *Live from St. Mark's Cathedral*, *From the Ashes: Richards-Fowkes Opus 21* in Somers, and *A Tribute to Yuko Hayashi: Richards-Fowkes Opus 14* at Duke University (released in 2020).



DLM Food and Resources has been very busy over the past several months!! For the month of July, the ministry served 340 people, 171 being children. For the most recent delivery on August 20, a total of 80 produce/non-perishable food boxes were prepared and delivered. In addition, 15 hygiene boxes were also distributed.

"The need is great right now," commented DLM Coordinator Darlene Anderson-Katz. "In addition to serving families involved with Project RISE, we are providing food boxes to more and more families each month.

"DLM is still closed to in-person shopping, and no clothing is currently be distributed. But, we hope to begin offering limited clothing in September somewhat like a drive-thru. We're still working on all the details," added Darlene.

There are a couple of ways you can support DLM.

Holy Trinity is once again partnering with Robinson CLC for the 2020-2021 school year to provide support to the students, staff and families ... our fifth year!!





Your Guide for Sunday Morning In-Person Worship



In-person worship has resumed on Sunday morning with one liturgy at 9:30 a.m. Livestream worship continues for those who are in at-risk populations or who wish to continue to avoid large gatherings. Those attending in person may be seen on the broadcast.



You must observe 6' physical distancing upon entry into and exit from the building and while in the Sanctuary.



Entry to the building will be by the north narthex door only. An usher in the parking lot will direct you to this entrance. Dismissal after worship will be guided row-by-row by the ushers through the door into the office lobby. You are asked to immediately exit through the

office entrance to your vehicle. Both the entry and exit doors will be kept open (weather permitting) to reduce surface contact and increase ventilation.



Hand sanitizer will be located near all doors and throughout the sanctuary. You must sanitize your hands upon entry and after any physical contact.



Upon entry, you will be asked to do the following:

- **Sign-in**—this will assist public health organizations if contact tracing is needed.
- **Have your temperature taken**—anyone with cold, allergy, or flu-like symptoms or anyone

with a temperature of 100° or more should stay home and seek appropriate medical care. Anyone with a temperature of 100° or more will not be admitted.

- **Sanitize your hands**—a hand sanitizing station will be set-up.



Masks must be worn by those not leading the liturgy. Please bring your own mask; only a limited supply will be available at the building. If you cannot or will not wear a mask, please worship at home via the livestream.



Seating in the Sanctuary will be guided by ushers on a first-come, first-served basis beginning from the front of the nave. Family groups from the same household may be seated together.



Additional changes to take note of:

- There will be no congregational singing during the liturgy. There will be other music (vocal and instrumental) offered by the worship leaders.
- There will be no sharing of the peace with physical contact. There will be no celebration of Holy Communion at this time.
- Bibles, hymnals and other printed materials have been removed from the pews.
- There will be no printed order of service provided. An electronic version is available for download on your own mobile device or download it from the website and print it at home to bring with you.
- We will not pass offering plates. Offering plates will be placed near the sanctuary doors (both entrance and exit) to receive our tithes and gifts.
- Restrooms will be available for use; one person at a time will be permitted.
- The nursery will not be open and child care is not available.
- There will be no in-person fellowship or discipleship time.

All public areas and high touch objects/surfaces will be thoroughly cleaned and sanitized before and after all in-person activities.

Beyond Sunday worship: small groups, ministry teams, committees, and studies are encouraged to continue meeting online.

Groups may meet in the building, if necessary, but must abide by physical distancing and sanitization protocols.

Meetings will be scheduled so that only one group is in the building at a time, and so that the meeting space may be cleaned/sanitized before and after.

This guide will be reviewed, modified and updated on an on-going basis, and as such, is subject to change, even to the point of closing again, should a change in the public health situation demand it. Visit our website for the most current information relating to this guide.
