Pastor David

As I write this, we are still about a week away from our first in-person gathering for worship since March 15. I think I'm as nervous about this upcoming Sunday as I was when I was leading a congregation for the first time as a newly ordained pastor. The way we are currently "doing/being" Church doesn't at all resemble what we were doing 15 weeks ago. We've had to adjust, adapt, and learn as much as we could as quickly as we could. And we've done that...not always successfully or happily, but we've done it.

A word of thanks is due here for the dedication and effort put forth by our staff and many volunteers. From DLM and other continuing outreach ministries, to our varied discipleship and education offerings, to those involved behind the scenes in managing the basic operations that keep the doors (somewhat) open, to Sunday morning worship leadership: these dedicated folks have kept us on task and on the mission. Thank you.

And a word of thanks is also due to those whose support for our work has not failed. There are plenty of folks whose livelihood has been deeply affected by the economics of the pandemic. Accordingly, not everyone is able to financially contribute to the congregation to the extent they would like. That's perfectly understandable. But others among us have continued to be generous. And as a result, we are able to continue to do the work God has called us to do in this place. Thank you.

But...what's next?

Clearly the way we do ministry has changed, is changing, and will continue to change. Some of the trends evident in our culture prior to the pandemic (lower worship attendance, a greater dependence on digital means of connection) have been hastened along by our current situation. For the sake of our viability as an on-going mission, we must recognize the changed landscape in which we work. We will and we are taking steps that will allow us to do just that.

But while the methods for our work have changed, the message has not. The very heart of our mission is the same: to be and to bear Christ in word and loving action to our neighbors, and to offer our lives to Christ by means so compelling that others will be called to join us. That mission has continued during the crisis, and will continue well into the future. Our work here is not yet complete. Bearing witness to the world around us is still who we are and what we do.

And so we will persist by God's grace and in the power of the Holy Spirit. That, dear friends, is what's next. †

Your Guide for Sunday Morning In-Person Worship



In-person worship has resumed on Sunday morning with one liturgy at 9:30 a.m. Livestream worship continues for those who are in at-risk populations or who wish to continue to avoid large gatherings. Those attending in person may be seen on the broadcast.



You must observe 6' physical distancing upon entry into and exit from the building and while in the Sanctuary.



Entry to the building will be by the north narthex door only. An usher in the parking lot will direct you to this entrance. Dismissal after worship will be guided row-by-row by the ushers through the door into the office lobby. You are asked to immediately exit through the

office entrance to your vehicle. Both the entry and exit doors will be kept open (weather permitting) to reduce surface contact and increase ventilation.



Hand sanitizer will be located near all doors and throughout the sanctuary. You must sanitize your hands upon entry and after any physical contact.



Upon entry, you will be asked to do the following:

- **Sign-in**—this will assist public health organizations if contact tracing is needed.
- **Have your temperature taken**—anyone with cold, allergy, or flu-like symptoms or anyone

with a temperature of 100° or more should stay home and seek appropriate medical care. Anyone with a temperature of 100° or more will not be admitted.

- **Sanitize your hands**—a hand sanitizing station will be set-up.



Masks must be worn by those not leading the liturgy. Please bring your own mask; only a limited supply will be available at the building. If you cannot or will not wear a mask, please worship at home via the livestream.



Seating in the Sanctuary will be guided by ushers on a first-come, first-served basis beginning from the front of the nave. Family groups from the same household may be seated together.



Additional changes to take note of:

- There will be no congregational singing during the liturgy. There will be other music (vocal and instrumental) offered by the worship leaders.
- There will be no sharing of the peace with physical contact. There will be no celebration of Holy Communion at this time.
- Bibles, hymnals and other printed materials have been removed from the pews.
- There will be no printed order of service provided. An electronic version is available for download on your own mobile device or download it from the website and print it at home to bring with you.
- We will not pass offering plates. Offering plates will be placed near the sanctuary doors (both entrance and exit) to receive our tithes and gifts.
- Restrooms will be available for use; one person at a time will be permitted.
- The nursery will not be open and child care is not available.
- There will be no in-person fellowship or discipleship time.

All public areas and high touch objects/surfaces will be thoroughly cleaned and sanitized before and after all in-person activities.

Beyond Sunday worship: small groups, ministry teams, committees, and studies are encouraged to continue meeting online.

Groups may meet in the building, if necessary, but must abide by physical distancing and sanitization protocols.

Meetings will be scheduled so that only one group is in the building at a time, and so that the meeting space may be cleaned/sanitized before and after.

This guide will be reviewed, modified and updated on an on-going basis, and as such, is subject to change, even to the point of closing again, should a change in the public health situation demand it. Visit our website for the most current information relating to this guide.

Vicar's Vision

The vicar's vision is a little cloudy these days. Like you, I have been struggling to see clearly what is coming down the road. The fog that blocks my line of sight is from the daily changes in our atmosphere. These drastic changes come in a variety of forms. Many of us have been staying at home a lot more. Our homes have become our offices, our restaurants, our social settings, our movie theaters. There have been changes in how we do our work even if we are not working from home. Physical distance measures have changed how we interact even when we go for a hike through the woods. I have been trying to navigate through the call process while working with two synod offices during this time. It is a strange time to be interviewing a pastor. And now as churches begin to open back up I prepare to navigate my departure from Holy Trinity and my beginning of a first-call. We are all trying to be church in liminal space between closed and open, a place that we have never been in before nor even imagined. No one knows for sure what ministry in the church and community will look like in the coming months or how we will be able to interact in that phase. Yes, things are a bit of a blur right now.

How do any of us plan?

There are two scriptures that come to mind as I write this morning. The first talks about the clouded vision with which we see. 1 Corinthians 13: 8b-10, 12 says, "As for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end.... For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." Our knowledge even when it seems clear is still a dim reflection of the truth that God sees. We never fully know what is going to be around the next bend, but God does. And this is why we can trust God even when we cannot see what is in front of us. When all is covered by a thick haze and we cannot see what is coming, we walk forward by that trust not by what we can see.

The other scripture is one that Brian is reminding me of often in these days. Proverbs 16:9 says, "The human mind plans the way, but the Lord directs the steps." Even when we think we know where we are going God is directing us in ways to something for which we have not planned. God's ways are greater than our ways. I may wander on my own as a lost sheep, but God finds me and sets me on the right path.

We do not know what the next few months will hold for any of us, but we can rest in the fact that God sees clearly and knows how to set us and keep us on the right track. †



How can we worship if we can't sing?

Singing together has always been a big part of worship for Lutherans. But during this pandemic, corporate singing carries a heightened risk of spreading the virus. So we are masked and mostly silent...and that's hard.



But we can still participate in the musical life of the church. And one way to do that is by making use of our bodies through movement.

*"All of life involves movement, and movement becomes dance when there is an inner life, a living Spirit directing it." **

Dance, which begins with God, is a part of prayer just as silence is a part of music. *"And the spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters."* (Genesis 1:2)

Other scripture passages – including the Psalms – invite us to dance. Such movement is not

performance, but an expression of prayer – a conversation between the Creator and the Created.

The Church already uses dance-prayer in its rituals. Notice ...

- those who preside at Holy Communion - the way hands gesture in prayer and blessing.
- the gathered assembly - how we kneel, stand, bow, process, share the peace of Christ.
- our musicians – ways we move together while leading our prayers and praises.

This corporate movement unifies us and makes us whole by connecting our inward life with outward expression.

In the coming weeks, we will experiment with some ways our spoken responses or musical offerings could be enhanced with simple physical gestures – nothing complicated or mechanical. The goal is to make such movements the expression of our hearts. (How we feel as we move is more important than how we look.) Slow, sustained, continuous actions help our own inner prayer to direct and mold our bodies.

In addition, we will occasionally join Allonna Stefanik in her use of American Sign Language during repeated liturgical responses and simple psalm or hymn refrains. From time to time, our Trinity Choir section leaders will invite us to accompany their singing with easy movements or simple body percussion.

We pray these opportunities to worship God with our bodies will enhance our prayer life and help us all contribute to our worship experiences in expressive ways. †



- Discussion Questions (it's not mandatory to get to every question, focus on the conversations that arise from the questions).
 - Today's Scripture reminds us that humans are created in God's image. What do you think God looks like? Wonder about what it means to be created in God's image.
 - Wonder about why God created humans last.
 - We hear from this Scripture that God has given us the rest of creation to care for as a gift. Wonder about what God was telling us to do.
 - Share something wonderful about how God created you.
- Closing Prayer: *Dear God, what a blessing to be created in your image! May we remember that each one of us has a piece of you with us always. Amen.*

Sunday, July 12th – God Creates Humans, Part 2 (Genesis 1: 25-31)

Family Service Project: Bearers of God's Image
How can we reflect God's image in our world?

- Write a note or card to a shut-in or help a neighbor with yard work.
- Pay for someone's coffee or meal without them knowing it.
- Walk around your neighborhood and pick up garbage or smile at a stranger.
- Clean your room without being asked.
- Remember to say "please" and "thank you" all day.

Sunday, July 19th – God Creates Rest, Part 1 (Genesis 2: 1-4)

- Read Genesis 2: 1-4. The words we just heard teach us that after everything God had created, God rested. These words also remind us that we should take time to rest and worship on the Sabbath.
- Discussion Questions (it's not mandatory to get to every question, focus on the conversations that arise from the questions).
 - Why do you think it is important to take time to rest?
 - What kinds of things help you rest well?


