# And All That Jazz by Pastor David Nevergall



We've developed an interesting pattern here at Holy Trinity: the end of the Days after Epiphany...as we transition into the more solemn and reflective season of Lent...have come to mean that it's time for jazz. For the past several years, we hosted a "Jazz Café" with plenty of good food and good music. This year, there are two opportunities to celebrate...a familyfriendly Mardi Gras party on Transfiguration Sunday, followed by a fat Tuesday evening concert with one of the jazz world's most lauded pianists, Fred Hersch. You'll find more info on both of these events at other places in this newsletter, and I hope you'll be coming.

What I find interesting about this from a theological perspective is the musical form itself. Jazz, especially as improvisation, takes a particular tune or theme and explores it from a variety of perspectives. That exploration is greatly influenced by the talent and experiences of the performer, as they use their particular skills and emotions in order to build a unique "take" on an established idea.

It occurs to me that this is not at all unlike our pursuit of the Christian life. God provides the theme: unrelenting love expressed in a grace that cannot be thwarted even by death itself.

We see that theme played out in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ. But we are not just watchers. We are also the recipients of the gift of that theme. And given the gift, we are called to work with it...to play with it...to learn and share how such gracious love might be expressed in ways that are consonant with our talents and temperament.



In other words, the Christian life is nothing less than a lick on the divine riff that is Jesus. Through our study of Scripture, our worship together, and our outreach work in the community, we learn what Jesus looks like and what God is saying to us. Then we get to dive into the power and joy of the gifts we have been given...living them out in ways that are the very best use of who we are as human beings. Maybe that means, like it did for Peter and Andrew, figuring out how fishing skills for fish translates into fishing skills for people. Maybe it's congratulating a child at Robinson as part of an awards ceremony or lending your beautiful voice to the Trinity Choir or serving in ways that allow your organizational skills to tend to the numerous chores that help a congregation function well. Whatever the cause or situation, God has been busy calling and equipping. And now we get to live out all that

jazz in lives of love and thanksgiving. †



# Here's How It All Began ...

1866 Rev. Morris Officer met with John Seiberling about forming an English speaking Lutheran Church. Over the next month, John Seiberling invited other Lutherans to meetings about forming this church.

June 15, 1868

Dr. William Passavant led a worship service of 25 Lutherans in the Reformed Church. Over the next three months, Dr. Passavant held meetings with a small group of Lutherans every two to four weeks in various halls and churches.

Sept 1868

A mission began and Rev. William Ruthroff became the first pastor. There were 18 active members, those considered the founding members of what later became known as Holy Trinity Lutheran Church.



The 'English Lutheran Church in Akron' became officially known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity. Rev. W.P. Ruthroff was installed as the pastor. †

# **History Notes**






"... it might be of interest to the congregation to know something of the source that prompted its undertaking ... In this fast age in which we live, we are apt to fox our minds only on the things of the present ... while we let the things of the past sink into oblivion. If lost history could be reproduced when needed, it would sometimes be of untold value ... there is a degree of sadness in the thought of the 18 original that constituted the membership of 1868 ... only eight are now living (1896) ...

In September of the year 1868, a mission church was organized. Rev. W.P. Ruthroff came here and took charge of the mission. The name was Trinity Lutheran Church. The 21st of June (1869) finally arrived. It was a bright morning; the sun shone in His glory, the flowers were blooming and a balmy breeze came from the south. At the time the congregation occupied Sumner Hall, and it was overflowing. When the meeting had done its work, a constitution adopted ... a full church council elected ... the name adopted. Now the church was established ... and now, after traveling through 28 years of checkered history ... (we) stand at the threshold of the future. Will these things endure that we have reared? This will depend on the character of those that occupy (the church) in the times to come."

This was written by John F. Seiberling for the 25th Anniversary in 1896. He was a charter member of the congregation in 1868. He was also a member of the first church council and remained a member until his death in 1903 ... more than 30 years. He was a prominent inventor and industrialist and among other ventures headed the Excelsior Reaper Works. He married Catherine Miller. The family lived at 528 W. Market Street, Akron. †

Grammy-nominated recording artist Fred Hersch joins the **Arts at Holy Trinity Concert Series** Tuesday, February 13, 7 p.m. Admission is free; however, a donation of \$20 is recommended. Doors open 30 minutes prior to performance. A reception follows the performance.

A select member of jazz's piano pantheon, Fred Hersch is a pervasively influential creative force who has shaped the music's course over more than three decades as an improviser, composer, educator, bandleader, collaborator and recording artist. A ten-time Grammy Award nominee, he continues to earn jazz's most prestigious awards, including recent distinctions as a 2016 Doris Duke Artist and 2016 Jazz Pianist of the Year from the Jazz Journalists Association. Proclaimed "the most arrestingly innovative pianist in jazz over the last decade" by Vanity Fair, Hersch has long defined jazz's creative edge in a wide variety of settings, from his breathtaking solo recitals and exploratory duos to his extraordinary trios and innovative chamber settings. With some three dozen albums to his credit as a leader or co-leader, Hersch consistently wins an international array of awards and lavish critical praise for his albums.

His latest release, Sunday Night at the Vanguard (Palmetto), is a definitive statement by his long-running trio with bassist John Hébert and drummer Eric McPherson. This CD was nominated for two 2017 Grammy Awards for Best Jazz Album and Best Jazz Solo. The trio's previous release Floating (Palmetto), described as "an extravagantly beautiful new album" by Nate Chinen of The New York Times, also earned 2014 Grammy nominations for Best Jazz Album and Best Jazz Solo. And the trio's two-CD Palmetto set Alive at the Vanguard was awarded the 2012 Grand Prix du Disque in France and named one of the year's best CDs by Downbeat.

A committed educator, Hersch has taught at New England Conservatory, The Juilliard School, The New School and The Manhattan School of Music. He is currently a member of the Jazz Studies faculty of Rutgers University. Hersch's influence has been widely felt on a new generation of jazz pianists, from former students Brad Mehldau and Ethan Iverson to his colleague Jason Moran, who has said, "Fred at the piano is like LeBron James on the basketball court. He's perfection." †







# Communion Bread Recipe

# Ingredients: .

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- tablespoons
  butter
  (unsalted is
  best; may
  substitute
  margarine)
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

## **Directions:**

Combine
 the first four
 ingredients
 well. Cut in
 the
 butter, and
 work in
 thoroughly.

- Combine the water and honey.
  Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth.
- Divide the flour into four equal parts. Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
  - Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.) Remove and allow to cool completely.

A Note from Your Stewardship Committee

# "The Lord loves the cheerful giver, but will even take money from a grouch."

We're not sure who first said this, but it gave us pause to consider: How do you give to your church? Do you do it cheerfully, grudgingly, dutifully, willingly or reluctantly? And how do you decide what to give? That may be an even more important question. As you think about your own personal response, please also consider this: We did not conduct a stewardship campaign in the Fall of 2017. Why not? Was it that Holy Trinity Lutheran Church did not need to conduct such a campaign because attendance at worship and subsequent offerings were up from the previous year? No, that decision not to push financial stewardship was made long before we saw those increases.

The reason there was no stewardship campaign last fall is because we are going to devote the Lenten Season this year to an effort to raise your awareness of the gifts you have been blessed with through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We trust that your response to that awareness will generate a generosity on your part through increased giving to and through Holy Trinity.

# But good stewardship is more than just money.

"Be One or Buy One." That motto from WWII had to do with inviting people to either enter military service or to buy War Bonds in order to support the war effort. It is an apt reminder that Holy Trinity has an army...an army of volunteers. Perhaps you are one. This congregation is blessed with a variety of service opportunities. Some of those tend to the chores of the church...the "inside" work of committees, worship preparation, facility care and administration. Some of those opportunities take us "outside" to the many agencies and organizations we support beyond our walls. Both inside and outside are important responses to the grace and love that God has given us.

And that is truly the definition of good stewardship: It is our whole-life response to divine goodness...a sharing in work and witness, in dollars and doing...of the love of Christ for the world. Thank you for your intentional and faithful stewardship. †

# A Look at the Numbers

It is a privilege to worship, to serve, and to give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with our neighbors and friends. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. And we do that together by our work as a congregation. That's what good stewardship is all about.

For that reason, we monitor statistics on attendance and giving to the church. They offer a glimpse into the health of our congregation. During 2017, average weekly worship attendance at Holy Trinity (Sunday morning and midweek services) was 176. That's up from an average of 161 per week during the same period last year ... an increase of a bit more than 9%. Worship is fundamental to the strength of the community and mission we share. Thanks for making it a priority in your life.

For the year 2017, our undesignated giving in support of Holy Trinity's ministry was \$463,296. Our budget estimate for that same period was \$397,496. That's 16.5% better than we had expected. Total income for the year was about 5.5% higher than what we had hoped to achieve, even though we took no income from the budget endowment for November and December. Thank you for your attention to your own giving habits. We continue to be blessed by your generosity.

We encourage you to continue that generosity in this new year. There will be an opportunity during Lent to learn more about giving as a spiritual discipline and to assess your own habits. 
By now you will have heard of **Holy Trinity's 150th Anniversary**
